

Türkiye: 2023 Earthquakes

Situation Report No. 9

As of 13 March 2023

This report is produced by the OCHA mission in Türkiye in collaboration with humanitarian partners and covers the humanitarian situation and earthquake response in Türkiye. Updates provided on emergency response activities reflect a summary snapshot rather than an exhaustive representation on all ongoing response efforts.

SITUATION UPDATE

- Turkish Interior Minister Süleyman Soylu announced on 13 March that 48,448 people lost their lives in the two powerful earthquakes that struck southern Türkiye on 6 February, including 6,660 foreign nationals, primarily from Syria.¹
- He added that more than 433 thousand tents
 have been established in the region, with 354 tent
 cities currently in operation. 21 thousand
 containers have been installed so far. Minister
 Soylu said 3 million 882 thousand hot meals are
 distributed throughout the region.
- According to Türkiye's Disaster and Emergency Management Presidency (AFAD), the total number of people provided with shelter and accommodation is more than 3.5 million. This includes about 1.9 million people provided with shelter in the earthquake affected region and more than 1.6 million people provided with accommodation in other provinces.
- Turkish Minister of Environment, Urbanization, and Climate Change, Murat Kurum, has announced that the construction for 27,253 housing units has begun.²
- 2.7 million people have been displaced in Türkiye by the earthquake.³
- Since the two major earthquakes on 6 February, there have about **16 thousand aftershocks** in the impacted region, causing fear among the communities. Most recently, early on Monday 13 March, AFAD reported two earthquakes of magnitudes 4.7 and 4.5 in Malatya. Meanwhile, an earthquake with a magnitude of 4.4 occurred in Hatay.





HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

The response to the earthquakes is being led by the Government of Türkiye, coordinated through the Disaster and Emergency Management Presidency (AFAD) and with the Turkish Red Crescent (TRC). The international humanitarian community is supporting the Government of Türkiye in providing immediate assistance to the affected population.

The United Nations and humanitarian partners are continuing to mobilize emergency teams and relief operations in Türkiye, in support of the response by the Government of Türkiye, and providing emergency relief, including food, medical supplies, shelter, winter supplies, hygiene and dignity kits and other life-saving items.

Below graphic provides a snapshot of ongoing humanitarian response provided by the United Nations and partners as of 13 March.



Communication with Communities (CwC)

UNHCR has been providing essential information to refugee communities affected by the earthquakes. As of 8 March, the UNHCR counselling line has received over 4,000 earthquake-related calls, seeking information about temporary accommodation or financial support. The top three nationalities calling were Syrian, Afghan and Iranian nationals. Most calls were received from Gaziantep, Hatay and Sanliurfa provinces.

The Turkish Red Crescent (Türk Kızılay) is communicating with affected communities through their 24/7, 5-language, Call-Centre and Online Hotline to inform and raise awareness among public institutions, society, and partners regarding the earthquake.





FUNDING UPDATE

On 16 February 2023, the UN has launched a **Flash Appeal** (available in English and Turkish) for US\$1 billion to assist 5.2 million people affected by the earthquakes. As of 13 March 2023, it is only **12.9%** funded with US\$130.3 million.
